EVALUATION SCHEME

Pre-Lab Assignments & Quizzes 15%

Individual work. Before each lab you should access the pre-lab materials found on *my*Courses. These include videos and the lab manual. After reviewing the prelab materials you will take an online quiz.

Quizzes must be completed by 1 PM on the first day of the lab sessions.

<u>Lab Reports</u> 35%

Group report. Prepared and completed *during* each of the 5 labs; submitted at the end of each lab session. No written material may be brought into the lab. The same mark is given to all members of a group.

Final Exam 50%

Held in April. 3-hour duration, closed-book. The exam will consist of 50 multiple-choice questions. The questions will be based on activities carried out in the lab, material from the lab manual, lab-report, pre-lab lectures and videos.

Supplemental/Deferred Exam 55%/50%

Held in August. It will consist of short-answer essay questions. It will be a 3-hr., closed-book exam.

<u>NOTE:</u> Marks are not increased arbitrarily: e.g., if your final aggregate mark is computed to be 79.5%, your mark will be reported as 80% (A–); a final aggregate mark of 79.4% will end up as 79% (B+).
